




In the late 19th century Chicago pork packers created a labor intensive lightning fast disassembly line: The Union Stockyards routinely processed 5,000 or more pigs every day: Taking just 15 minutes to completely slaughter each pig: Hundreds of workers performed specialized tasks in the process: Hanging the live pig onto a chain by a hook in its leg: Clamping the pig's leg chain to a big wood wheel: As the pig rose screaming on the high turning wheel they slit its throat: Scalded it: Hooked it to a cable: Scraped it: Cleaned it: Washed it: Inspected it: De-gutted it: De-larded it: Decapitated it: Split it into parts: Then swept the few remaining bits off the floor to sell as Spam in a can:
